FROM THE PASTOR'S PEN

In these experiences, as well as others, the reality that existed was that there were always the ingredients of lost hope, discouragement, anxiety, and in addition to these the disconcerting question surround-

ing great controversy among the believers. We see all of this and more, leading to another ingredient to be dealt with, which is confusion. This is nothing new in all of history . . . confusion existing with the leaders, peoples in general, and God's people. We see all of this in our nation now with regards to health, education, church, family, business, law, government, and most all sectors of our society. Currently, one should have great concern for our education system, for the truth is this segment of our society has an effect on nearly all other sectors of our society.

So . . . in the midst of all of this upheaval what is a person supposed to do??? It would seem to me that the Scriptures call us to pray, pray, pray . . . and more praying . . . and from the Word of God, "Pray without ceasing." I Thessalonians 5:17. It's easy to recognize the predicament in which the church finds itself, all the way from some saying to trust God completely for our protection and to gather for worship without consideration for others concerning such precautionary practices as facemasks and distancing, while then there are those who've adopted the "way of love" approach by following the "Love Your Neighbor" Scriptural prescription. One example of this end of the spectrum is the Baptist church of Andy Stanley of Atlanta, Georgia, and son of the highly respected over many decades, Charles Stanley of First Baptist in Atlanta. Considered as a theologically conservative congregation, North Point Church, where Andy pastors, has made the decision to delay meeting corporately until after the first of the year. Then there are the many congregations in between seeking God's will for each individual church as to when it is the "right time" and "safe time" for their congregations to open and what, if any, safety measures should be implemented.

In considering our own Church Family, prayer is of utmost importance, that God will clearly direct our thoughts and actions according to His Will. Referring to the meaningful message shared recently so elegantly by JO SWEATT, as she emphasized the need for God's people to PRAY for **Repentance** as individuals and as a nation, for a **Return** unto God and a **Revival** of spiritual renewal for each individual personally and thus for our Nation.

The Lexington Trails Middle School seen by all when driving by states a very appropriate message for each of us as well as our community . . . "A SETBACK is a SETUP for a COMEBACK." Does God have a plan? Our Christian Faith says it very positively . . . "GOD ALWAYS HAS A PLAN"! . . . Amen and so be it!
